News from the Slope - Mark Baldacchino, Slope Coordinator

Happy September, TP Gulls!

There's been a lot of activity going on at the slope scene over the summer, especially for being in a pandemic lockdown. We finally gained some momentum in improving our pit area with AstroTurf. About a year ago when we had a Scale Plane



Fun Fly, I realized that just two or three 5-6 meter planes took-up the majority of the existing artificial grass pit area. Our former president, Dan Cummins, located a source of used football field AstroTurf in rolls that are 7.5' X 25'. These rolls have tiny rubber pellets that infill the grass to simulate the ground. These rolls, we're told, weigh 2,300 pounds, (yes, over a ton) each, and have field markings, but what a deal!! We purchased six (6) rolls for under \$500, and the work began. Ray Pili, our club cheer leader and work horse, used his van and trailer to pick these rolls up form a place in Temecula, and trailered them to the Gliderport. The people at the Temecula place would let Ray take only two rolls at a time for safety reasons. Yes, Ray made three separate trips from Temecula to La Jolla to deliver our new turf.

Thank You, Ray!

On July 27th, we scheduled a work party to lay-down the first set of rolls. I used my truck and a tow strap to slowly pull the rolls off of the trailer, then, being so heavy to move around, the unroll grass dumping all of the rubber infill onto tarps to lighten up the rolls for placement. Once we got the rolls in place, and cut to size, the real work came into play replacing all of the infill by shovels. hand using buckets, and а wheelbarrow.

We had 10 guys working and took three hours to install two rolls. Whew! As of this writing, we're 1/3 done, as we have four (4) more rolls sitting off to the side in the LZ waiting for us. It was decided that we would wait for the heat and humidity to pass before we tackle these four. Our plan is to use a mini tractor that one of the TPSSS members has, to move these rolls

around, and we're in hopes that we won't have to unroll, and dump all of the infill, but rather just move the rolls into place and call it even. We'll see, if not, it's going to be the same process to put these four rolls in like the first two.

This was the 2nd official F5J contest held at the Poway Flight Center. Ten guys came down to try and nab some low-level thermals. The day did not disappoint. There was a very interesting twist this time, however. Our landowners farm the land for hay, and they baled the hay recently. All good right? Except that the placement of the hay bale stack turned out to be right at the approach (east) end of the mowed area, our DLG pilot box. It looked like quite the daunting obstacle. But, with a little tweaking to the landing zone (moving it farther to the west) we effectively removed the obstacle from play. You could still hit it if you wanted to of course, but it was far enough out of the way that most normal approaches could fit in quite easily.

There was a spectacular low level thermal attempt in the first round by yours truly. I shut it down at 10 meters and hooked an immediate 180 to come in for a perfect landing and a total flight time of about 30 seconds resulting in a flight score of.....wait for it.....68 points. Probably the single worst flight of my RC career. Suffice to say, I have adjusted my motor control so I won't "accidentally" shut down my motor again... Ugh.

LSF Procedures for Poway

We will follow the COVID-19 rules outlined by Chuck Norris for the Poway DLG contests. I paraphrase:

- 1) Pilots must have a mask when arriving at the field.
- 2) Masks are required when you are within 6 feet of separation such as during pilots meeting.
- 3) Masks are optional when flying or timing, as long as the 6 feet separation is maintained.
- 4) Hand Sanitizers/disinfectant wipes will be provided for users of high starts and winches and any measuring devices used.
- 5) Everyone is encouraged to bring their own writing utensils to record results and to sign as witness.
- 6) Maintain 6 feet separation between pilots and timers at all times.
- 7) Please stay home if you do not feel well or have any symptoms associated with Covid-19.

As a reminder, LSF is a 5 level program for RC Glider Pilots. Each level has increasingly more difficult tasks. LSF involves Slope flying, Thermal flying, Spot landings and Contest participation. Each level must be completed before proceeding to the next. Makes for a well-rounded RC Glider pilot.

The pure glider program is called SAP (Soaring Accomplishment Program). The electric launched glider program is called Electric SAP (ESAP).

LSF Report (continued)

As you can see, Level I is not that difficult if you are a thermal pilot. If you fly slope only, that 5 min. thermal will tear you down. With Poway and Torrey within fairly close proximity, I believe someone local can complete Level I in one day.

If you are interested in participating, bring your AMA card, a thermal plane or e-thermal glider such as the E-flite Radian and download a copy of the Accomplishment Vouchers (SAP or ESAP) from the LSF site (https://www.silentflight.org/index.php/lsf-program/lsf-tasks). The event is free, you don't have to be a Gulls member.

The Vouchers describe in more detail what each task involves and the credentials of your witnesses. Submittal of a completed voucher is as follows:

1. Email the LSF Secretary John Marien: john@ne-aero.com a clear photo, or PDF scan of your completed (and signed by witnesses) Voucher.

That's it. No more sending money or sending your original hard copy.

John will then review your voucher and email you your acceptance or rejection of the voucher submission. If for some reason your voucher is rejected, you will have to adjudicate rejections with John.

Another nice change is while you are waiting for a reply you can down load a new voucher and start on the next level.

TPG at 50: Looking Back - Gary Fogel Build and Fly Contests

Mark Smith was a tremendous advocate for RC soaring in southern California. He and his father had grown up flying with the Harbor Slope Soaring Society in Orange County but when Mark opened up Mark's Models in Escondido to manufacture the Windward, Windfree, and later the Wanderer and other designs. His proximity to San Diego was TPG's gain.

In order to provide his many kits, Mark ordered balsa from Ecuador. Huge balsa shipments would arrive in boxes...boxes also made of balsa! The balsa used for the boxes was low grade and thick, not suitable for the manufacture of kits. But honestly what modeler can throw out balsa? Not Mark.

Thus the "TPG Build and Fly" contest was soon born. Mark Smith would show up at Torrey Pines early one weekend morning and dump a pickup truck bed full of balsa planks on the ground. Contestants (at first as individuals, in later years as pairs) would then gather to survey the wood. At the appointed time the contest would begin, and people would scramble to grab the "choice" balsa bits and quickly amass their own small piles. Building began immediately, with people madly carving, sawing, sanding, gluing, etc. The contestant first to launch their contraption off the cliff, soar for a period of time (usually something like 10 min) and then land back on top was declared the winner. Of course if the contest started at 9am, this usually gave people a few hours to complete their building before the winds arose. On days when the winds came early or when the contest started a bit late, the mad flurry of balsa shavings and things "not quite yet ready to be thrown off a cliff but thrown in tribute anyway" was a delight to watch.

This contest series first started very early in the history of the club, probably sometime between 1971 and 1973 and continued annually well into the 1980s and I think even into the early 1990s. Of course the price and scarcity of balsa increased, as did the traffic at Torrey, making it further difficult to have such events. Yet it would be fun to try to have something similar to this again but with other lower cost materials like poster/foam boards, etc. It could also be limited these days to specific micro gear to further reduce the amount and cost of materials.

The event was also a great way to involve spectators. The building area for the first few contests was close to the parking lot, just about where the porta-potties are today near the shack. This proximity to beachgoers led to a lot of look-loos and questions about RC soaring, people getting introduced to the hobby and the realization that for the cost of the RC gear, just about anything might fly. It was also instructive to watch master builders make theirie contraptions quickly, shape airfoils just with a rasp and get epoxy all over the place. 

This Month: Roger Fraser, 1993 Modeler of the Year

Again I'm back to another modeler that I knew but one that I do not have much information to go on in terms of a biography using info from newsletters. Roger joined the TPG sometime in either the late 1980s or 1990. Gravitating to thermal soaring, by 1992 he volunteered to serve as club winchmaster. This was at a time with high turnover on the board, as well as large regular monthly contests. There were lots of demands placed on this position. Roger served in that role at the time that Steve Condon served as president. The club purchased new deep cycle batteries for all of the winches and Roger Fraser identified a new source of winch line and cleaned and maintained every winch and retriever.

In September 1992, the club arranged for new club shirts and jackets with a nice logo designed by Paul Naton. Roger volunteered to manage the orders and distribution of all of the TPG clothing, doing so at a time when the club had regular monthly meetings with >100 persons each time. Once again the job required considerable effort but Roger just stepped up and completed the mission.

In 1993, Steve Condon continued on as president and Roger continued on as winchmaster. At the time Roger was flying an Airtronics Legend at the monthly thermal contests. According to Steve, Roger was also a carpenter at San Diego State University and a general handyman with welding skills.

The Airtronics Vision radio that Roger used for his Legend was obtained from Steve in trade for having Roger's friend in the metal shop machining parts for two Rich Spicer-designed F3B winches. In exchange for that machining, Roger helped his friend with the construction of a garage. It was a trading trifectal At those times thermal contest aircraft were mainly an assortment of Airtronics Legends, RnR Genesis, Airtronics Falcon 880s, Synergy Ills, and so forth. Roger routinely finished middle of the pack but was a consistent entrant. Also in 1993, Roger built and installed the gate that we use still to this day at the Poway Flight Center!

By November 1993, the board of directors nominated six Gulls for the honor of Modeler of the Year. In order these were 1) Roger Fraser, 2) Erik Larson, 3) John McNeil, 4) Charlie Richardson, 5) Don Richmond, 6) Ron Scharck. At the December club meeting, a vote of the membership was held by secret ballot with Roger Fraser winning the award for his considerable dedication to the club in 1992 and 1993, especially, according to John McNeil, because his rebuilding of the winches and retrievers had a catalytic effect on club interest at thermal duration contests.

In that golden age of TD contests it was common for 20-30 participants to be enjoying the day together. Steve Condon remembers Roger being a super nice and generous guy, even supplying the two large maple slabs that ended up becoming Steve's workbench!
