# <u>Sky Rider</u> – The latest book By Gary Fogel, TPG Club Historian

TPG Historian Gary Fogel has a new aviation history book being released in September called "Sky Rider: Park Van Tassel and the Rise of Ballooning in the West." The biography follows the journey of Van Tassel from his earliest efforts with balloons in the 1880s in California leading to the first balloon flight at Albuquerque New Mexico in what is now considered as a balloon capital and home to the Albuquerque International Balloon Fiesta.

Van Tassel then traveled by rail, bringing balloon exhibitions to one location after the next throughout the west and as far east as New Orleans, showing the possibility of manned flight to thousands of spectators. Based largely in the San Francisco bay area, Van Tassel then co-invented a new type of parachute, and embarked on another tour to bring parachuting to the masses with skydives from smoke balloons. Some of these events included the first women to skydive, despite public concern for death defying feats.


He expanded his horizons, bringing ballooning and parachuting to Australia, Indonesia, China, the Philippines, Myanmar, and India. He later continued to Africa, Persia, Russia, and Europe before returning to the bay area and helping launch the sport of recreational ballooning with clubs.

The book weaves together these many journeys (and at least five wives) into a cohesive story that finally places Van Tassel among the prominent aerial exhibitionists of his time. There is even a glider connection to the book, as for a short time Van Tassel was associated with John Montgomery and his balloonlaunched gliders in the bay area in 1905.

Perhaps this will be a topic for one of our future TPG virtual club meetings.

For all current and recently joined TPG members:

Yahoo Groups no longer supports groups. In order to maintain a line of communication among members, we have a TPG Google Group.

Please make sure that our club Membership Chairman has your current email address. You can confirm this by contacting <u>membership@torreypinesgulls.org</u>. If you are not already a member of the TPG Google Group, you will be sent an invitation to join.

When you join as a member of the private TPG Google Group, the club will distribute notifications, newsletters, contest events and holiday party info, etc. This information will keep you informed of all club activities throughout the year. You **don't** need a Gmail address to participate in Google Groups, but you do need to be a member of TPG.



Google Groups provides a great way of communicating with one another. ### RCGroups - Torrey Pines Gulls Forum

RCGroups is the most widely used and active online Radio Control Community for everything RC, from planes to cars, to boats, drones, radios, power systems...pretty much anything RC! It includes forums, specific interest threads, blogs, discussions, etc....and, more importantly, The Torrey Pines Gulls Forum.

To get started, click on the link or web page below to get to the TPG Club forum. You can also get there from the Clubs link at the lower right of the RCGroups home page and scroll down to Torrey Pines Gulls.

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If you haven't yet joined RCGroups, click on the <u>Sign Up</u> link at the upper right and follow the instructions.

Unlike the old Yahoo Forum, RCGroups allows you to post photos and videos. By subscribing, you can keep up with the latest events, club activities and member postings.



### News from the Slope (continued)

On August 21<sup>st</sup>, we **celebrated our club's** 50th anniversary, again. I say "again" because the real anniversary celebration was to be in 2020, but with the pandemic, **we just couldn't make** it happen.

It was another cloudy day, but the sun peeked-out every now and then. The temperature was perfect, at 73° F, and the wind was straight in at ~10 mph. For something fun to do, and something that hasn't been done at the slope for many years, we decided to have a bit of competition. Not the usual F3F type racing, but a landing competition. Much like TD or F5J, landing closest to the pin determines the winner. I made a nylon tape and marked in in feet and inches, rather than points per meter. We put the tape right in the middle of our new artificial landing strip, and dove right in.

We completed four, (4) rounds of landing, with six (6) competitors. The only rule was that one is required to launch their plane normally out over the cliff edge, then walk back and land. There was no order in which to land; just coordinate with the other pilots as to who's going back to land. We also didn't specify a class of plane for this contest, so there were planes as small as a Weasel and as large as a 4m moldie. We also didn't ask for an entry fee; just signup and participate! I believe everyone had a blast, and we blew through these four rounds in about an hour. I had enough 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place ribbons that were given for each round. It was fun to see how some competitors did better with each round, and to see others actually do worse – we'll blame it on the wind! © Half of the planes didn't have, or use spoilers or flaps, so "dorking" a landing at the end of the tape was fun to watch. On a side note, Arthur Mickiewicz showed up not knowing that we had a fun fly or a contest, and ended up taking home three ribbons!

This series is open to everyone with AMA (must be Full or Youth membership) and a Foam F5J sailplane with the intention to introduce folks to F5J. Guests are welcome to compete; no experience is necessary. The format will be geared for first time F5J contestants. Expect ample time between rounds to get your stuff together, timer help, understanding Rules and Task support, and responsible use of the "Mike Smith Rule". Registration is via F3X Vault. CDs are welcome to volunteer. The schedule for the rest of 2021 is:

Examples of Foam F5J planes are: ParkZone Radian and Radian XL, EFlite Night Radian. Multiplex Easy Glider, Solius. This list is not exclusive. Other planes may be acceptable but please check with the CD prior to registration. The spirit of the requirement is to allow contestants to compete and learn with inexpensive planes. If you don't have an F5J competition altimeter, come fly anyway...we have a workaround.

### July TD Contest Report – Tom Watson, CD

Field: Encinitas Flight Center

Date: July 11, 2021

Six pilots flew in TPG's July TD contest. The weather was quite warm with some high clouds and very light breezes. Task times were 5-8-10-10 minutes with a standard 100 point tape landing. There was very good lift available for the entire contest, though sometimes one had to range out to find it.

Everyone had fun and it was a good flying day. The scores were tight at the top...Mike Smith won, behind him in second by just 0.75 points was Tom Watson, and another 4.91 points down was Arthur Markiewicz in third. Put another way, in a 4,000 point contest the spread between first and third was 5.66 points!

The club's COVID guidelines are now relaxed significantly, but we continue the process of electronic registration, payments, and competitor score entry on Tim Traver's F3X Vault platform. Everything works well and it saves a bunch of time, so we plan to keep using it.

Our next contest is F5J at the Poway Flight Center, on September 12<sup>th</sup>. Hope to see you there!

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### July DLG Contest Report – Scott McCurdy CD

The monthly DLG contest was held July 17<sup>th</sup>. Ten pilots registered for the contest and I selected 3 heats for each round, due to slightly cooler temperatures compared to the June contest; and to give me a little more time between rounds for my first time as CD.

My appreciation to participants who got up extra early to join the contest. Christoph Efstathiou made the trip from LA County, Marc Maher from Orange County, and Ron Rossetti from Riverside. Jun Catacutan made a best effort to head south to join, but was turned around on the I-15 closure. Hope to see Jun at the August contest. Other pilots were Ray Pili, Dale Osborn, Chuck Norris, Don Lochhead, Cliff Hunter, and Mengchen Li. Thank you all for making this contest work. I arrived at 7:00 AM, surprised to be the second arrival behind Christoph Efstathiou, Christoph and Chuck Norris helped with the setup. Ray arrived with the tablet and the contest started at 9:05 am to very calm winds.

The first round was 5 Longest Flights (2:00 maximum) and the second round was 3 Longest Flights (3:00 maximum), since I wanted to follow Mengchen's example from the previous contest for warm-up tasks. Thermal heating started early and Chuck Norris and Marc Maher received full scores for both rounds.

Cliff Hunter received a perfect score for Round 2 by demonstrating a Master Class of low altitude thermal hunting.

### July DLG Contest Report (continued)



Next was the All Up/Last Down (3:00 maximum) which is a popular task at Lake Eldorado, and without a timer on the field, makes for an interesting pilot-to-pilot contest. This time it was Ron Rosetti and Marc Maher again with perfect scores.

Round 4 was 2 Flights Max, 10-minute Working Time. I think this is the most challenging task, since there are only 2 throws. A lot of strategy involves whether to launch first or wait until your neighbor shows you where the thermals are and try to catch-up. Ray Pili, Mengchen and Ron Rossetti earned a perfect score. This is the round where the competitor field scores started to separate.

A steady wind picked up for Round 5 Big Ladder and the advantage turned to the pilots that had experience flying in windy conditions and had a strategy to ballast for the conditions. ## July Foamy F5J Contest Report - Ray Pili, CD

July's Foamy F5J contest was a challenge! High pressure with hot and humid conditions made for weak and hard-to-find thermals.

6 pilots attended, Gary and his Son Dru came out for their first F5J contest. Gary came in from up north and Dru from down south. New RC pilot Seth, a friend of Mengchen's from UCSD, came out for his second F5J contest. Seth's first F5J contest was his first time flying RC after many hours of SIM time. Rounding out the group was Don, Mike and me. Mengchen helped with timing and coaching Seth. We flew four 10 minute rounds in two heats of 3.

First round; Ray and Gary won their heats. Notable was Don getting 50 landing points. Flights were all 5 minutes or less. Notably, Seth would have taken the 1K but lost on landing points, scoring 959.

Second round; Gary won round 2A with a 9:18 plus burying the others. Seth won 2B over Don, who got points with a lower launch and more landing points but could not overcome **Seth's** 60 second flight time.

Third round; 3A Seth's lower launch height gave him the 1000 over Ray. 3B; Gary won, maintaining his lead.

Fourth round; 4A Dru had a great round with twice the points as the next competitor, Seth. 4B; Mike did the same with over twice the points over Gary. Strong showing in round 4 by Mike moved him from 5th to 3rd place overall. Nice comeback! Gary had 3K going into 4B, but lost too many points, giving Seth the win.

# LSF Report - Ray Pili



Hi Gulls,

We **didn't plan** any LSF-specific events for 2021, although the Foamy F5J contest on October 3<sup>rd</sup> qualifies for LSF eSAP credit. In the meantime, here's some general information about the League of Silent Flight Soaring Accomplishment Program:

As you can see, Level I is not that difficult if you are a thermal pilot. If you fly slope only, that 5 min. thermal will tear you down. With Poway and Torrey within fairly close proximity, I believe someone local can complete Level I in one day.

If you are interested in participating in a scheduled LSF event, bring your AMA card, a thermal plane or e-thermal glider such as the E-flite Radian and download a copy of the Accomplishment Vouchers (SAP or eSAP) from the LSF site (<u>https://www.silentflight.org/index.php/lsf-program/lsf-tasks</u>). The events are free; you don't have to be a Gulls member.

The Vouchers describe in more detail what each task involves and the credentials of your witnesses.

The Vouchers describe in more detail what each task involves and the credentials of your witnesses.

Submittal of a completed voucher is as follows:

1. Email the LSF Secretary John Marien: john@ne-aero.com a clear photo, or PDF scan of your completed (and signed by witnesses) Voucher.

#### That's it. No more sending money or sending your original hard copy.

John will then review your voucher and email you your acceptance or rejection of the voucher submission. If for some reason your voucher is rejected, you will have to adjudicate rejections with John.

Another nice change is while you are waiting for a reply you can down load a new voucher and start on the next level.

As a reminder, LSF is a 5 level program for RC Glider Pilots. Each level has increasingly more difficult tasks. LSF involves Slope flying, Thermal flying, Spot Landings, Cross-Country Flying and Contest participation. Each level must be completed before proceeding to the next. Makes for a well-rounded RC Glider pilot.

The pure glider program is called SAP (Soaring Accomplishment Program). The electric launched glider program is called Electric SAP (eSAP).

Many of you know Steffen Peters, a regular at the Gliderport, skillfully piloting his beautiful scale ships over our world-famous soaring venue.

Well, in addition to his well-known RC piloting skills, Steffen has long been involved in Olympiclevel equestrian competition.

From the US Equestrian website (<u>https://www.usef.org/team-usa/athletes/steffen\_peters</u>): Born in Wesel, Germany, Steffen Peters came to the United States in 1984 to work for trainer Laurie Falvo in San Diego. Southern California was a good fit for Peters, and he made the decision to stay, and became a U.S. citizen in 1992. He has been one of the country's top international dressage competitors ever since, having represented the U.S. at five Olympic Games, four FEI World Equestrian Games, and two Pan American games.

Steffen competed at the 1996, 2008, 2012, 2016, 2020/21 Olympics, bringing home the Bronze Medal in team competition in 1996 and 2016; and this year, achieving 10<sup>th</sup> place in Individual Dressage and taking the Silver Medal in team competition. Congratulations Steffen and the United States Equestrian Team!

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### This Month: Ian Hirschsohn 2001 Co-Modeler of the Year

Ian Hirschsohn was a special TPG member who took pride in educating others, especially youngsters, about the joys of RC soaring. I'm not sure if he was the instigator or not, but in 2000-2001, Ian became involved with Torrey Pines High School, mentoring a group of students not only with RC gliders but also with the annual Science Olympiad program. For those of you who are not familiar, Science Olympiad is an annual science competition across high schools in the USA challenging kids to solve specific tasks on their own, generally through hands-on projects. Founded in 1984, the Science Olympiad continues to the present (https://www.soinc.org/) and often includes free flight rubber band or glider contests with specific wingspan and/or weight requirements. Having a mentor like Ian to help a team avoid pitfalls is generally key to success, and makes the project fun. In the February 2001 issue of the Gull Wings, Ian wrote, "From my

experience any kid that is willing to apply himself or herself (there are as many she's as he's) can win the event, it is not a test of aptitude or innate skill. The rules of each event are published and available months beforehand. The bottom line is that it introduces the kids to scientific principles in pleasurably challenging way. The reason I have been a coach for Science Olympiad for the last 6 years is that many of the students I have instructed have gone on to MIT, etc."

In June of 2001, Ian helped arrange for a visit of the TPG to Torrey Pines Elementary school for an on-site demonstration of thermaling via histart and a good assortment of different types of aircraft for static display. This was a part of the school's "Science Discovery Day."


The kids were pleased and later wrote thank you letters to the club that were published in the August 2001 issue of Gull Wings. For instance student Zach Jones wrote "Dear glider enthusiasts, I had a lot of fun in being a part of your glider class. It was my first time being able to be the pilot of a real glider plane. I have seen other people building and fly glider planes. I was jealous and wanted to try to fly one and you made my wish come true. Thank you. Sincerely, Zach Jones." Hmm. Given Zach was in elementary school in 2001, he should be in his mid-20s/early 30s by now. Paging Zach Jones – paging Zach Jones – now is the time to sign up for TPG membership!

Ian also began holding a TPG training program on Tuesday nights at Discount Hobby Warehouse to help newbies learn how to properly set up aircraft, and assisted in flying instruction at Torrey Pines on Friday afternoons. Jerry Craft (the other co-modeler of the year for 2001) assisted in these efforts. By December 2001, several new TPGers were finishing off their EPP Highlander kits, ready to test fly them at Torrey and continue as new members.

In addition to all of this activity, Ian served as TPG slope coordinator in 2001. In 2002 he became TPG "training coordinator." Because of his sustained efforts on behalf of TPG and the local community to raise awareness and interest in RC gliding and new members for TPG, the club honored him with the 2001 Modeler of the Year trophy. I'm not sure what became of Ian – if you happen to know please do reach out.


