Keith Finkenbiner February 28, 1932 – June 23, 2022

A Celebration of Life Service for Keith will be held in July; Details to follow.

We received the unfortunate news of the passing of long-time TPGer and RC modeler Keith Finkenbiner on June 23rd. Keith was a keystone supporter of every RC club he belonged to, helping in the background to make things feel seamless, helping new people get into the hobby and in general being an amazing person. Keith received the 2008 TPG Co-Modeler of the Year award for his effort (along with Cliff Hunter and Tom Minegar and others) to merge the North County Clouds thermal soaring club into the TPG and find a new thermal field at the Encinitas Landfill. In 2020, he donated the remainder of his RC collection to the TPG as a club fundraiser, for which he again received the Modeler of the Year Award. Annual Membership Dues are as follows:

- Full Members \$60 per year
- Youth Members (19 years or younger) \$5 per year
- Student Members (full-time) \$30 per year
- Receive a credit of up to \$20 on your annual dues. \$10 per each half-day working at any TPG flying field

New members joining in the first six months of the year pay the full rate. Those joining in July through September pay half the applicable rate. If you are a new member joining in October through December you pay the full rate but your membership is considered paid through the end of the following year. Student Members. Student members of the Society shall consist of those persons who have a current full-time student status at a college or university, have current membership (full or youth) in the AMA, have signified their interest in model aeronautics and a desire to be such a member of the Torrey Pines Gulls Radio Control Soaring Society, Inc. and have paid all requisite dues.

For all current and recently joined TPG members:

In order to maintain a line of communication among members, we have a TPG Google Group. Please make sure that our club Membership Chairman has your current email address. You can confirm this by contacting membership@torreypinesgulls.org. If you are not already a member of the TPG Google Group, you will be sent an invitation to join.

When you join as a member of the private TPG Google Group, the club will distribute notifications, newsletters, contest events and holiday party info, etc. This information will keep you informed of all club activities throughout the year. So, verify that the club has your correct email, make sure you receive an invitation to join Google Groups and sign up!


RCGroups - Torrey Pines Gulls Forum



2022 Foamy F5J Clinic and Fun-Fly contest Series

For 2022 we will be continuing with our F5J Foamy events at Poway, with combined Clinics and contests scheduled for Saturday mornings from 9-12 on:

- August 27
- November 5

Based on our popular DLG Contest and Clinic format, this year we are going to emphasize the "Clinic" aspect while continuing to fly contests. This is first and foremost a fun-fly event. So, if you are just getting started in F5J or just looking for an excuse to dig out your Foamy for a morning of relaxing flying this is the event for you.

Future clinics will cover the aspects (rules, strategies, scoring, timer duties, etc.) of F5J contests that are a bit different from other TD events.

The contest element will be set up to emphasize the fun-fly aspect. We will have the field configured with landing tapes and the sound system. To get the most flying in for everyone, the flight window will be reduced from the regulation 10 minutes down to 7 minutes. We will plan on at least five rounds so everyone will get in plenty of stick-time.

We will ask everyone to pre-register on F3X Vault:

(https://f3xvault.com/?action=event&function=event_view&event_id=2334) and will be using self-entry of scoring results to give those of you who may not have used this system yet a chance to get some practice. Entry fees for the Clinic and contest will be free for TPG members and \$5 for non-members. We have opened a thread on RC groups so everyone can stay up to date on the event:

We are hoping that this event will help to introduce new pilots to what TPG has to offer. The council is considering the purchase of a club Radian that would be available for new members to learn to fly on. To make this work we will need some club members to offer to act as mentor pilots. If you would be interested, please contact any council member.

June F5J Contest Report - Cliff Hunter, CD

The June 12th F5J event was at our Poway Flight Center. Attendance was good and we ended up with ten pilots. We flew five rounds with one throw-out round.

We started off with the pilots meeting at 8:45 am. Fight safety was discussed, including field boundaries and the "No Fly Zone" over the horse facility (See below for detailed Restricted Flight Zone safety rules for Poway Field).

In addition, we had computer and speaker problems. TPG vice-president, Bob Hirsch stepped up and announced all five rounds. He was the life saver of the day! Thank you, Bob!

The weather was hot (90°+) with clear skies. The morning had little wind, which gradually increased throughout the day; and of course Poway's traditional varying wind direction, thermals and as usual, sink. The lowest launch height of the day was 61 meters, and the highest launch height was 192 meters. There were a few great low-level saves again. Tom Kiesling won with a perfect score of 4,000 points, Bob Schumacher was second with 3,990.69 points and Mike Verzuh was third with 3,976.85 points.

June F5J Contest Report - (continued)

Following the June 12th F5J contest, we received several complaints from the horse facility owners of low flying planes over the corrals. During the contest, I did remind flyers they were in the No-Fly zone. I regret that I missed some. It is especially important that all club members and visitors understand the importance of following the "Restricted Flight Zone." By violating these simple rules, you risk losing your flight privileges at the Poway Field. Also, you jeopardize the privilege to fly for everyone in the club. As all of you know, trying to find a new field in San Diego County is next to impossible.

It is every pilot's responsibility to follow the "No-Fly Zone Rule" and to call people out if they are too close to the No-Fly Zone. Please review the Poway Flight Center Rules, below:

Torrey Pines Gulls - Poway Flight Center

Welcome to the Poway Flight Center - We Are Guests Here

Our ongoing use of this property is totally dependent on being good guests. Please respect the rules and make safe flying your number one priority.

Horses and People

The areas surrounding the field are an active horse facility. As such horses and people are likely to be nearby. Even if you are in the flyzone you are responsible for maintaining a safe distance between your plane and the horses and people.

What Is Required To Fly Here?

- AMA membership. If you are a visitor please be prepared to show your card.
- Membership in the Torrey Pines Gulls (or be accompanied by a TPG member)
- Everyone must obey all AMA and local flight regulations.

What May I Fly Here?

Poway is a glider only field. No powered aircraft of any kind (including e-gliders) are allowed.

Restricted Flight Zone

Due to the proximity of the horse facility there are strict limits on where flight is permitted. If you violate the zones you risk losing your flight privilege here and possibly jeopardize the privilege to fly here for everyone.

The entire area over the horse facility is No-Fly



At the last Executive Council meeting, the following contest procedures were adopted:

- 1. No-fly zone rules will be clearly outlined at the pilots meeting.
- 2. The timer will also be responsible for making sure the pilot stays within the boundaries.
- 3. During the contest, violators will be given a warning. If the pilot does not immediately exit the no-fly zone, he/she will be penalized 1,000 points (effectively a zero score for the round).
- 4. A second violation during the same contest will result in disqualification from the contest.
- 5. Same pilot violations in multiple events may result in banning the pilot from flying at Poway. Need for such action will be assessed case-by-case.

June DLG Contest Report - Chuck Norris, CD

The weather was amazing; sunny but not too hot. We had a small group a total of six pilots, so we went with only two groups and were able to get in a total of six rounds. We used Tim Traver's fantastic new F3X Audio program to run the contest, so setup was very simple; and last-minute changes to the lineup were no problem. With only two groups, sometimes it's hard to find time to enter scores, so I adjusted the gap between groups to give another minute of preparation time. That seemed to help a lot, although we occasionally paused to allow people to catch up.

During warmup, the lift was soft and seemed to be everywhere. The first task was "One Two Three Four, Any Order", and we were all optimistic that we would find 4 minute air without too much trouble. But Poway's fickle weather turned around, and by the time group A started, there wasn't a 4 minute thermal to be found anywhere. The best group A could do was under two minutes. Things improved considerably by group B, with John McNeil dropping only 15 seconds for the round.

Round two was 5 x 2, and conditions continued to stay pretty good, with lots of 2 minute flights in both groups. John McNeil took group A, dropping 1:11 and I took group B dropping only 21 seconds. I was quite pleased, although I showed I need a lot of work on my quick turns, bobbling more than a couple.

Round three, Big Ladder, was pretty challenging for group A. Only John McNeil managed to get a 3 minute flight, with some imperfect flights in between. By the time group B flew, things were looking better, with all pilots managing to get most of their 3 minute flight time; but with some carnage for the 2 minute flight to spread things out.

Round four, Last 2 x 4, was a personal disaster for me. I was launching well, had a great read, and hooked up into a great thermal right around the time my battery died. It was high enough voltage to report the battery voltage of 2.4V, but not enough to move any servos. I watched as my plane began to porpoise, stalling at the top and recovering to do it again, all the while gaining altitude. I watched until I lost sight far downwind to the east. At this point, I left the contest to try to catch a telemetry update from Sycamore Canyon Road to the east, but I wasn't able to get a single ping. I spent the next round searching and returned in time to time for John McNeil in round 6. The short version is I never found it, despite considerable effort including a lot of back-country hiking that evening after the temperature dropped.

Round five, 3 x All Up, 3 minute Max, was tough all around. There was only one 3 minute flight in group A (Don Lochhead), and two in group B. ALL the rest of the flights were under 2 minutes, and some well-under one minute. Poway was being Poway!

Round six, Poker, was tough for everyone, as usual. Conditions were falling apart, with the wind starting to blow, and the longest flight of the round was a single 2 minute flight by Cliff Hunter for a total of 4 minutes on the board, which earned him a K! The next closest was just 1:30 and people had to work really hard to get THAT. Cliff's 2 minute flight was quite an achievement considering the conditions. Most people had to work pretty hard just to get 1:30, with lots of multiple flights required to get the time.

June DLG Contest Report - (continued)

Final results ended up with John McNeil in the lead, with a total of 5 Ks; Ron Rossetti in second with 3 Ks and Don Lochhead in 3rd with one K. The F3X Vault results are shown below:



I wish I could say I had a good time. Losing my plane was a not a fun way to spend the day. But I certainly enjoyed the flying that I did manage to do, and I think everyone else had a good day. Conditions were challenging, but everyone had flashes of brilliance. Every pilot got at least one K during the day, something that doesn't happen often.

Depending upon club member interest, additional LSF Attempt Day events may be scheduled

As you can see, Level I is not that difficult. With Poway and Torrey within fairly close proximity, it is absolutely possible to complete Level I in one day with help from witnesses.

In order to participate in the LSF program, please go to: https://www.silentflight.org/index.php/lsf-program/lsf-tasks. Bring the voucher as well as your AMA card to one of the TPG events and get started! It's as simple as that.

Submittal of a completed voucher is as follows:

1. Email the LSF Secretary John Marien: john@ne-aero.com a clear photo, or PDF scan of your completed (and signed by witnesses) Voucher.

That's it. No more sending money or sending your original hard copy.

John will then review your voucher and email you your acceptance or rejection of the voucher submission. If for some reason your voucher is rejected, you will have to adjudicate rejections with John.

Another nice change is while you are waiting for a reply you can down load a new voucher and start on the next level.

As a reminder, LSF is a 5 level program for RC Glider Pilots. Each level has increasingly more difficult tasks. LSF involves Slope flying, Thermal Flying, Spot Landings, Cross-Country Flying and Contest participation. Each level must be completed before proceeding to the next, which makes for a well-rounded RC Glider pilot.

The pure glider program is called SAP (Soaring Accomplishment Program). The electric launched glider program is called Electric SAP (eSAP).

TPG History: The Trophy - Cliff Hunter



This Month: Keith Finkenbiner, 2008 Modeler of the Year

This article is about long-time TPG member, Keith Finkenbiner who, sadly, passed away this past June. It was originally published in the November 2020 issue of Gull Wings.

Keith had retired from RC soaring, and after a thermal duration contest in February 2020, a select group of club members went to Keith's house and cleaned out his garage, moving his collection into the TPG cargo container at the Encinitas field. The intent at the time was to host a large swap meet to sell his hobby collection before our yearly International Hand Launch Glider Festival in April. However, the coronavirus hit the "WORLD" and life as we all knew it changed.

Thus, the swap meet was not going to work. Keith's collection in the cargo container created storage and space problems. Thus, a photo catalog was created to display the items that were for sale. The TPG Board allowed the catalog to be placed into the TPG Newsletter as a Summer Sale Supplement. The items were stored at Cliff Hunter's garage in San Marcos during this process. Over the years, Keith amassed quite a collection of planes, kits, tools, supplies, etc.! More than 200 items were sold to fellow hobbyists from TPG and other clubs in the region. The sale netted a total of \$4,754.00. Following the sale of these items, Keith and Shirley Finkenbiner made it known that they intend to donate all of the proceeds to the Torrey Pines Gulls RC Soaring Society. Keith has been a tireless worker behind the scenes for TPG for decades. especially when it comes to competition and



field maintenance for Encinitas other projects. His kind contribution to the club helps the TPG survive a challenging year and is appreciated by many. The following provides a brief history of Keith's involvement and love of model airplanes.



Brief bio as relayed by Keith (88 years old) and Shirley Finkenbiner in September 2020 to Cliff Hunter

- ➤ Keith built his first "rise-off-ground" (ROG) free flight model planes in 1940.
- ➤ In 1941, his uncle and cousins who lived with his family went into the service and left all their modeling things with him. Keith migrated through Brown Jr. motors, free flight, and then control line.
- ➤ Whenever kits were released for model aircraft or u-control, Keith would build them. He basically built them all. The best was P40 Olson & Rice with 60 gas engine.
- ➤ In 1950-54, Keith had joined the U.S. Air Force and was stationed at Williams AFB Chandler, Arizona with the 3525-3526 Pilot Training Group. There he trained pilots for instrument flying using Link Trainers, then an A-T6 Texan then T-33 Shooting Star jets.
- ➤ Keith built his first RC radio transmitter in 1956. Back then RC transmitters were hard to find and building them from kits or from scratch was the way to go. In 1958 Keith's neighbor was also into RC. Keith joined the Weak Signals RC Club in Toledo, Ohio. Weak Signals started a conference on RC that continues to this day.
- ➤ Keith started in RC Pattern Flying but switched to gliders when his son showed some interest. His son didn't care for motors. (Smart kid!)
- ➤ Keith moved to New Jersey in Sept 1967 and continued flying RC.
- ➤ In November 1973 as RC soaring really "took off," Keith moved again to Naperville, IL. There he joined the popular S.O.A.R. club serving as Vice President and President. He helped run the very popular SOAR NATS that predated the establishment of RC soaring Nationals via the AMA.

- ➤ In January 1979 he moved once again to Wilmington, DE. He continued soaring, this time as a part of the East Coast Soaring League.
- ➤ He flew in the first AMA-sponsored World Championship at Lakehurst NJ (Lakehurst Naval Air Station) in 1982 or 1983.
- Fortunately for us, in June of 1982 he moved to Fremont, CA and joined the South Bay Soaring Society. At least he was now in California.
- ➤ Three years later in July 1985 he moved to Carlsbad, CA flying with the North County Clouds and then the Torrey Pines Gulls.
- ➤ A regular through many thermal duration competitions from the 1970s through to the 2000s, Keith attained League of Silent Flight (LSF) Level V #108 finalizing this on June 13, 2002. (Only 138 people in the history of RC soaring have made this achievement)
- ➤ He was honored as the TPG Co-Modeler of the Year in 2008 and again as Modeler of the Year in 2020.
- ▶ He (2008- 2018) helped in the development and maintenance of the new Encinitas Inactive Landfill flying field by making barricades to protect the methane piping, purchased the cargo container, adding shelving, grinding, painting the cargo container with approval of the San Diego County Landfill Section. Purchased a riding mower and trailer. The trailer and mower then could transport the mower to other fields. Did yearly inspections at the Encinitas Field with County of San Diego. Mowed the Encinitas Field as needed yearly with some help, not a small task with at least (3) plus hours of mowing.
- Over the last (18) years, Keith served as a Contest Director for thermal duration competition at Encinitas filling that role many, many times.
- ➤ Keith was the SC² (Southern California Soaring Clubs, 10 clubs) representing TPG and CD'd the SC² contest every year in October at the Poway or Encinitas fields.

- ➤ Keith was also an active member of CVRC (Central Valley RC Soaring Club) located in Visalia, CA. They held the largest sailplane contest (two-day contest) in the United States, at least 300 contestants each year. It is the first weekend in every October. Keith often served as an announcer for the rounds and pilots and he always managed to fly as well.
- ➤ Keith has been a tireless worker behind the TPG scenes (never wanting any recognition for his hard time consuming work) for many years, especially with regards to competition and field maintenance.

In February 2001, as newsletter editor, Gary Fogel published another biography on Keith in the club newsletter. This one has additional detail:

Gary Fogel 2/2001: Keith has been a tireless worker behind the TPG scenes for many years, especially with regards to competition. Thanks for the hard work Keith!

KF: I got started in model aviation very early at age eight just before WWII. My uncle and cousins who were living with us were building and flying rubber and gas free flight models. My job was to chase after them and retrieve. When the war broke out and they enlisted in service inherited the models. They also sent me many of the consolidated model kits to build during the war. I grew up in Toledo, Ohio and belonged to the Model Manglers Club which became the Toledo Weak Signals. Eight club members started the original Weak Signals symposiums at a local golf course in the dead of winter to break the boredom and see what other modelers were doing. I helped direct many of these early shows. Look what it has become today.

When the Korean War broke out I enlisted in the Air Force and trained fighter pilots in P-80 and T-33v jet airplanes. After the war I returned to

Toledo and attended college. My professional career started as a chemist for Union Carbide. My work in polymer chemistry took me all over the United States and I belonged to many different clubs such as Central New Jersey RIC Club with Leon Shulman and many other early free flight competitors, Chicago Soar Club with Dan Pruss and the Soar Nationals, South Bay Soaring Club in San Jose, Visalia Central Valley Club and TPG in San Diego. I have been president of many of these clubs and also Secretary/Treasurer of LSF for five years, VP of East Coast Soaring League for four years. Currently I am chairman of the FAI Electric Team Selection Committee for the United States.

Competition flying in both Power and Sailplanes has been my main interest. Flew with the first FAI team for the United States in 1974 at Lakehurst, NJ. Placing third overall. I have been team manager for both F3B in England and F5B and F5D in Australia. I have attended every team selection for F5B and F5D in the United States.

My work in TPG has been to help where possible using my experience with competition events. I am a Contest Director and Leader member of AMA with number 650. I was asked to direct the FAI team selection for F5B which was held in San Diego in 1998. I also work with the International Hand Launch committee each year. Because of my commitment to work at Neutronics as President/CEO I am not always available to help with other club events.

My favorite competition sailplane is a design that was developed with three of my friends called the No Name Sailplane. Many friends have asked why such a name and the answer is it doesn't need a name as we don't want to sell them or be in the manufacturing business. The model has no secrets, just straight forward practical application of twenty years' experience. I am happy to discuss it with anybody interested. I am hoping to retire next year and enjoy the time to build some models and go flying more often. At sixty eight years old I still enjoy competing with the young hotshots. I believe it keeps you young.

To paraphrase our current President, Ian Cummings; the love of silent fight is a common thread among all of us in the club. The volunteerism and participation that members like Keith have shown over the years, has been the key to the success of

Torrey Pines Gulls Soaring Society.

On October 1, 2020, Keith and Shirley Finkenbiner presented a cashier's check in the amount of \$4,754.00 as a donation to Torrey Pines Gulls Soaring Society to Cliff Hunter, who received the check on behalf of TPG. This was a result of many club members' efforts cleaning out his garage, which held his collection of planes, kits, tools, supplies, etc.

The collection was sold through the *Gull Wings* Newsletter over the summer. Over 100 items were sold and 25 interested buyers (95% TPG members) purchased everything imaginable!






