October DLG - Poway Invitational Report - Mengchen Li, CD

On October 15th, we held a special full-day DLG contest, the 2nd Poway Invitational. Last year, we had our 1st Poway Invitational in September, and we weren't 100% sure if we were going to make it an annual event. Last month, we got a request from our friends in Arizona. They would make our contest in October in preparation for the Blue Sky over Arizona in November, so they wanted to have a longer contest to make the trip worthwhile. This was also a very good motivation for us to hold our 2nd Poway Invitational, which may finally become an annual full-day contest.

We organized this contest from scratch within a limited timeframe. We created a rough plan in mid-September, and then started our preparation. We had everything ready in late September were able to announce the October 15th contest. A shoutout to everyone involved in organizing this contest: Gary, Chuck, Don, Cliff, Bob, Justin, John, and maybe myself. Great teamwork!

We had 19 pilots registered, with 17 showing up to compete. Besides pilots who are very familiar with Poway field, we had Charles Martin and Ed LaCroix making the trip from Phoenix, Kevin Jantz from Thousand Oaks, Matthew Calkins from Victorville, and Will Lalla, a middle school student from the east LA area. It was also good to see the return of some old friends who haven't been involved in contests for a while.

I left for Poway from LA at 4:30am. Cliff, Chuck, and Don helped me set up the field. The pilots meeting started at 8:15am. I introduced the rules and regulations at Poway field to those pilots who came here for the first time. The contest started right after the pilots meeting, at 8:30am. Thanks to Chuck and Gary for helping me deal with the timing and speaker system, so that we could start the contest on time.

The first round was All Up Last Down. I was hoping this task would make some huge differences on scores as the first round when I set the task list. The air in the morning is floaty. If you can launch high enough, you'll be able to cruise around with low sink rate and find a thermal. 5 pilots got the K in this round, and 3 of them were in heat C.

We then flew Task A, Last Flight (5:00 max in 7 minutes). The conditions were perfect. 16 pilots got the K in this round. Everyone had a great time.

The third round was 1234. Ed from Arizona got the K in heat A. Jun only dropped 1.4 seconds in heat B and made the K with no doubt. I dropped 5.3 seconds in heat C and made the K.

The fourth round was 5 Longest; another quick turn task. Brent, Jun, and Kevin were the K in heat A, B, and C with 6.4s, 3.6s, and 5s drop respectively.

Round 5 was 3 of 6 (3:00 max). This is not a quick turn task, but requires some strategy. Jun was the only pilot making the whole 9 minutes. Justin and Charles got the K in heat B and C with 7+ minutes.

After round 5, we took a lunch break, returning at 1:30pm. Some pilots stayed at the field, while others went to Poway to grab some food. Some pilots visited Rubio's, where we used to have a group lunch after the half-day monthly contests. I drove my friend, Chenghan Liu (today's photographer), back to La Jolla, so it took me a while to get back to the field.

Round 6 began at 1:30pm. The clouds were scattered, and we could see dense dark clouds to the east, so we would have to proceed with caution. This round was a new 2020 Task; 2 flights in 10 minutes. Mengchen Li made 9:47.7, which was the longest time in this round. Kevin and Jun made the K in their heat.

Round 7 was 3 x 3:20. We were definitely starting to see dark clouds approaching from the southeast and a cluster of newly developing cumulus clouds appeared in southwest. The first two heats were fine, but the rain started right before the heat 3. I made the call to continue and finish round 7 and then call it a day. Jun, Kevin, Dale, and I (of course with our loyal timers) stood and flew in the rain for ten minutes. Cliff, Brent, and Jun got Ks in this round.

I had planned to call it a day after round 7 due to safety consideration. However, people were more vigorous than me. They insisted to wait for another 30 minutes and see what will happen. We kept checking and refreshing radar map and forecast under the tent. It was funny. Fortunately, the rain stopped in 20 minutes, and it never became as heavy as I have to stop the contest, so we continued to round 8.

Round 8 was big ladder. The condition was just fine with little wind. Brent, Jun, and Mengchen got the Ks.

We took a short break to put all the scores in and see who would make the flyoffs. After I double checked all the scores, we had Kevin, Jun, Justin, Brent, and me, Mengchen, in the flyoffs. Interestingly, the score difference between No.5 and No.1 in the 8 preliminary rounds was only 172.72 points, so all the flyoff positions were well deserved!

The flyoff rounds included most challenging tasks: Huge Ladder, Single Flight, and 3-call Poker. It was already late afternoon. The air was chilly and not active anymore; and it was almost impossible to find a strong thermal. Finally, Jun came back from 4th place after preliminary rounds and won the contest. Mengchen was in the 1st place after preliminary rounds and finished with 2nd place in the flyoffs. Brent, Justin, and Kevin were in 3rd, 4th, and 5th place respectively. All of them brought some hardware home after an exhausting day.

Sterling Schweizer 1-34 Build - Brad Lang

We received an email from Brad Lang describing his build of a vintage Sterling Schweizer 1-34 kit that he completed a few years ago and recently maidened at Torrey:

I built and Monokoted a Sterling 1-34 around 1976 which didn't last too long. It was not pretty. In 2012 I purchased another kit and decided to glass it, paint it with Klass Kote, urethane and some Callie graphics. Lots of wood! I Finished it like my classic pattern airplanes. The wingspan is 100". The 1-34 is a little heavy at 4.75 lbs. and includes Graupner spoilers and reflexing ailerons. The build is posted in RCG's Sailplane Talk.

It flies very well at Torrey with 15-17 mph wind; Futaba Super 7 SS for guidance. It was completed in 2017 but the First flight was earlier this year at Torrey. Lots of help from TPG club members for the maiden...Thank you!

TPG History: The Trophy - Gary Fogel



This Month: Don Lochhead, 2009 Modeler of the Year



Don Lochhead was born in Ithaca, New York near Cornell University. He grew up in the community of Essex Fells N.J. as a child. Don's interest in aerospace began with Estes model rockets, which he enjoyed launching with friends in the area. This included not just standard rocket models but those that had a CG shift or boost gliders for additional fun. He also built plastic models, but models that sat there on a desk didn't seem as appealing.

After doing well in high school he applied to one college, Cornell University, and was accepted with early admission. He focused during his first two years on general courses in engineering

towards a bachelor's degree. However, in his third year he clicked with several professors involved in the emerging field of solid-state microwave devices. This led to a new cycle of morning classes and lab work in the afternoons, with accelerated learning in labs with federal funding. As a result, Don became adept at developing breadboards using the devices developed by his professors, publishing his research with organizations such as IEEE. After graduating with his BS in Engineering, he continued at Cornell with a Master's Degree in Engineering in just 1 year (a non-thesis degree).

After his graduation, he took two interviews with companies in Los Angeles (TRW and Hughes) and opted to take the position at TRW. These job offers came right away given the nature and importance of Don's technical work. When Don arrived in Los Angeles from New York and saw the palm trees outside of

LAX, he figured that southern California was for him. He found a place to live nearby in Redondo Beach.

TPG History: The Trophy (continued)

At TRW, his initial efforts focused on communications and very shortly he was given increased responsibility on a variety of projects regarding satellites. As TRW wanted to expand its interests to avionics and also expand its geographic reach, it established a new division in San Diego (first at Sorrento Valley and then at Carmel Mountain Ranch). Don was asked if he wanted to move to San Diego. The answer was of course, yes. He found a place to live in Rancho Bernardo and largely worked on avionics for military aircraft including the F-22 and F-35 and other projects largely sponsored by Lockheed and

Boeing. This position also required Don to travel regularly both nationally and internationally. He also helped develop avionics for the IAI RQ-5 Hunter unmanned aerial vehicle and perhaps one can consider this as his first foray into RC, except at large scale. Following 36 years of continuous effort for TRW (and then Northrop Grumman after the purchase of TRW), Don retired in 2008 having generated numerous patents and publications.

In about 2004/2005, Don read an interesting article in the San Diego Union; a short note about an international RC model glider contest being held in Poway. It sounded interesting so he checked it out and was amazed to see a bunch of pilots doing DLG at the IHLGF. This was cool! He purchased an EZ Glider for training on a hi-start and joined the club in 2005. After a year of learning on the EZ Glider (actually several...), Don purchased a used Lighthawk II from Aradhana Singh Khalsa of New Mexico who had attended IHLGF and he flew that plane for a time; then purchased a Blaster II; then a first-generation Snipe; then short nosed Snipes, and most recently a Concept CX5 and BAMF2. When Don was also starting out, he purchased a Shadow and flew that at both Poway and Encinitas for thermal duration but gravitated more towards hand launch than thermal duration over time.

TPG History: The Trophy (continued)

During 2007-2008 the TPG was just commissioning the Encinitas field, and there was a general request to help with projects to get that field established. Don answered the call, connected with Keith Finkenbiner and Cliff Hunter and helped get the trailer set up with shelving; helped fix the solar cells on the storage container for battery charging; helped build wooden barriers for the methane pipes at the field with Cliff and Arthur Markiewicz; and even built picnic tables for the club's use at club fields. He also helped build the carts for the club winches and all of the signage at Encinitas. Given all of the effort being made, Don was an easy choice for the Modeler of the Year trophy at the December meeting in 2009, largely for his effort at the Encinitas Field and general support of the club.

Don's effort however, didn't end there. In 2010 he was asked to serve as winchmaster, which he did for one year. However, the club had a more pressing need in 2011 for a treasurer and Don volunteered to switch to that role: a role he continues to serve to the present. Given a corporate background, Don reorganized the club's finances. In 2011 he received the Modeler of the Year award again as Treasurer along with Mark Canfield (President) and Mark Wood (Slope Coordinator) specifically for helping "the club to recover its footing after becoming a bit disorganized over the past year or two." Bill Eckles, then newsletter editor noted: "These three guys deservedly are being recognized for service well above and beyond the normal expectations of club members. Don has gone to great lengths to untangle a confused financial situation and bring order and reason to our fiscal future."

Roosevelt. Interestingly, Archie also volunteered during World War I for service and became a certified pilot in the 182nd Aero Squadron of the Army Air Corps.

Annual Membership

TPG's membership period is January 1st through December 31st. Renewals begin November 1st of each year.

Club Dues are as follows:

- Full Members \$60 per year
- Youth Members (19 years or younger) \$5 per year
- Student Members (full-time) \$30 per year
- Work Credit You will receive a credit of up to \$20 on your annual dues; \$10 per each half-day working at any TPG flying field. When filling out your registration form, there is a place to input your hours/credit.

New members joining in the first six months of the year pay the full rate. Those joining in July through September pay half the applicable rate. If you are a new member joining in October through December, you pay the full rate, but your membership is considered paid through the end of the following year.

How We Compete (continued) 2022 F5J Fun Fly and Contest/Clinic Series



November 5th marks the fourth and final event for the year. We started out calling this a foamy event because the Night Radian was (and continues to be) the most popular plane to fly. However, as the year progressed, we have been simply calling it an F5J Fun Fly because any glider under 2 meters that can be flown to the F5J rules as we apply them at Poway is welcome. In fact, our February event was won by Corky Miller flying his Yellow Jacket.

We configure the field with landing tapes and the sound system to get as close to full-up F5J flying as possible. To maximize everyone's time flying we reduce the flight window to 7 minutes.

If you have been thinking about getting into F5J, but weren't sure where to start, this is the event for you. Night Radians are not only affordable but also fly surprisingly well. In fact, they have even been known to be spotted at our regular F5J monthly contests.

Pilots meeting is at 8:45 with first up at 9 am. We typically fly five rounds of a 3-heat format finishing up by noon. The event is free to TPG members and \$5 for guests. We do ask everyone to pre-register on the F3X Vault so we know how many pilots to expect and can run the matrix ahead of time.

As you can see, Level I is not that difficult. With Poway and Torrey within fairly close proximity, it is absolutely possible to complete Level I in one day with help from witnesses.

What is LSF? - (continued)

In order to participate in the LSF program, please go to: https://www.silentflight.org/index.php/lsf-program/lsf-tasks. Bring the voucher as well as your AMA card to one of the TPG events and get started! It's as simple as that.

Submittal of a completed voucher is as follows:

1. Email the LSF Secretary John Marien: <u>john@ne-aero.com</u> a clear photo, or PDF scan of your completed (and signed by witnesses) Voucher.

That's it. No more sending money or sending your original hard copy.

John will then review your voucher and email you your acceptance or rejection of the voucher submission. If for some reason your voucher is rejected, you will have to adjudicate rejections with John.

Another nice change is while you are waiting for a reply you can down load a new voucher and start on the next level.

As a reminder, LSF is a 5-level program for RC Glider Pilots. Each level has increasingly more difficult tasks. LSF involves Slope flying, Thermal Flying, Spot Landings, Cross-Country Flying and Contest participation. Each level must be completed before proceeding to the next, which makes for a well-rounded RC Glider pilot.

The pure glider program is called SAP (Soaring Accomplishment Program). The electric launched glider program is called Electric SAP (eSAP).








