We had a spectacular day of flying on October 21st with many UCSD aeronautical engineering students. Gary Fogel and Chuck Norris were competing in a DLG contest at Poway early in the morning, but graciously left early to come out to the Gliderport to help assist with the students. We started about 1:30 PM, which was good timing, as the wind came up to about 10 MPH, straight in from the west at that time. About 20-25 students showed up, and it was the largest turnout of this kind, ever! From TPG, teaching the students was Gary, Chuck, Marty Zimmerman, Walt Quitt, and Ian Cummings. Gary did a quick intro of our club's colorful history, and the participating trainers; then we split up into groups of approximately five for some ground school.

TPG/UCSD AIAA Mentor Day at the Gliderport – Gary Fogel

October 21, 2023 was a great day for TPG and for UCSD student members of the UCSD-AIAA (American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics) chapter and UCSD AIAA Design Build and Fly (DBF) team. Five TPG members volunteered to assist as instructor pilots including Walter Quitt, Marty Zimmerman, Chuck Norris, Ian Cummings, and Gary Fogel. TPG Slope Coordinator Mark Baldacchino and photographer Bob Hirsch also attended along with members of the AIAA San Diego Chapter Nick Candrella and Rich Kenney who took additional video and photos. TPG members arrived around 12:15/12:30 for setup with winds already out of the west at 5-7kts.

A goal of this event was to introduce students to RC soaring in a manner similar to what the club did previously in the spring. Given Torrey is within walking distance of UCSD, it makes sense for aviation-minded students to know a bit more about the gliderport and to see if RC soaring is for them or not. As lead up to the event, Gary Fogel worked with AIAA student representatives at UCSD to coordinate. This resulted in a signup sheet with 30 students interested in the outing! We were fortunate to have such interest and fortunate to have TPG mentors show up with buddy boxes ready for the mission.

Around 12:45/1:00pm students began arriving. We started with a brief introduction about the Gliderport and its history and airspace safety by Gary, then self-introductions by each mentor highlighting their background and experience. We then divided randomly into groups of about 6 students per mentor towards a “ground school” instruction that showed the students model aircraft components; how the transmitter works; what to expect in flight; right/left reversal issues that are common when flying toward the pilot vs. away from the pilot; how the buddy box system will work and typical communication to expect between instructor and pilot when flying. We reiterated the importance of the “blue sky rule” at Torrey and staying well away from manned traffic.

After about 30 minutes of ground school and Q&A that followed, mentors started flying their aircraft with each student group. The aircraft were generally light-wind condition stable aircraft. The soaring conditions cycled from about 7 kts to 10 kts with periods of solid lift and weaker lift. Each mentor cycled through the students to make sure everyone had a chance to fly for at least 3-5 min. It was interesting to observe the students during this process, as some took to flying very naturally; others not as much, but even with just 5 min of instruction, each student was flying better at the end of the instruction than when they started and understanding the process along the way. Smiles and grins were common and everyone seemed to have a great time. It was hard to know who had more fun, students or instructors.

Things can always be improved, but we now have several UCSD students interested in learning more about RC soaring with the TPG. October DLG Contest Report – Mengchen Li, CD

We had our October DLG contest on October 21st, 2023. This is the second to last DLG contest this year. We are almost there!

This time, 12 pilots registered. We were happy to see Chris and Scott come back to the contest. I chatted with Chris, and he said the last time he was able to fly a DLG was back in May. Besides the contestants, there were also a few visitors and volunteers. Bob Hirsch cancelled his registration a day before the contest, but he still came to the field and helped by taking pictures. Good job team!

Due to a scheduling conflict with an event at Torrey Pines Gliderport, we tried to make the pace of the contest tight and fast. Therefore, I designed 6 rounds with 2 heats in each round.

Since I hope to prepare for the Blue Skies over Arizona contest, which is two weeks later, I picked the tasks that I usually have trouble with for the contest tasks this time.

October DLG Contest Report (continued)

Round1: 1234 – we started the contest around 9:10 am. The thermals were light, but it was enough to make a 4-minute flight. In Group1, 4 pilots accumulated their time over 9 minutes. Our youngest pilot (well, it used to be me), Milan Bregman, managed to get 9:26 in total. It was not easy. I couldn't do that at his age! Gary won the heat with a total time of 9:53.3. In Group2, 3 pilots were able to have more than 9 minutes total flight time. Mengchen Li won the heat with a 9:58 total time.

Round2: 3x3:20 – the calm conditions persisted in this round. The thermal **didn't** drift very fast, so it was possible to catch the same thermal for different flights. Gary won heat 1 with a 9:54.0 flight time. Justin was only 2.8 seconds behind. It was pretty close. Mengchen got heat 2 with 9:56.7 flight time. John and Chuck also accumulated a flight time over 9:40. Nevertheless, we saw some score separations in this round.

Round3: AULD – we started to feel some breezes during this round. The conditions became a bit more active. Mengchen and Kevin got all 3 flights and shared the K in heat 1. Ed was the only pilot who maximized all 3 flights in heat 2.

October DLG Contest Report (continued)

Round4: Huge Ladder – this task is my kryptonite! The Huge Ladder killed me every time I saw it (IHLGF and Nats), so I decided to practice it more. We were in a huge sink cycle at the beginning of heat 1. Most pilots only had a 1-minute flight for their first attempt. Only Don made the full 3 minutes. Conditions turned better then. Mengchen and Ed got the whole 5 minutes for the second attempt. The third attempt was a disaster. Only Gary achieved the target time of 7 minutes, and others were approximately 3:35 at most. Kevin conquered heat 2. He had a total time of 14:49. It was impressive.

Round5: Last 2x4 – Gary and Chuck were headed to Torrey, so there were only 10 pilots left. The wind was getting stronger. Cliff won heat 1 and Mengchen won heat 2. Mengchen was the only one maximizing 8 minutes.

Round6: Best5x2 – we typically put this task in early morning, but this time I wanted to try something different. We were experiencing a typical Poway afternoon while flying this round. Ed got the K in heat 1 with 9:37 and John got the K in heat 2 with 8:24.

Seven of us met up for the final event of the year. We had a good variety of planes including Night Radians, a Yellow Jacket and a couple of other 1.5-meter and 2-meter foamies.

Lift was light for most of the morning and tended to stay towards the west end of the field, with only an occasional pilot drifting downwind to the east. We flew six rounds with a break at the half way point to swap out batteries and a quick clinic. Gary shared some safety tips and discussed the value of getting setup for your landing to maximize landing points, versus trying for “just one last turn” to stretch out air time.

At the end of the morning, Gary Fogel was on top with an impressive clean-sweep of six K's. Brett Locke came in second with Tom Farley completing the top three. F3X Vault scores are below.

We had one new pilot (Bill Buchwald) join in the fun. Bill quickly adapted to the F5J format and we look forward to seeing him back out in future contests.

This completes our 2023 season.

TPG History: The Trophy – Gary Fogel

This Month: Tim Traver, 2014 Modeler of the Year



Tim Traver started flying RC gliders in 2009 at the suggestion of a friend. Since then, he's been one of TPG's most dedicated pilots to both thermal and slope competition. Despite the annual success of the International Hand Launch Glider Festival, the TPG had lost momentum in developing its own core group of dedicated DLG enthusiasts. In 2013, Tim Traver, John McNeil and Gary Fogel recognized this issue and decided to hold some club DLG contests in the fall of that year to test interest. Everyone seemed to feel it was a useful direction, so a full monthly series was proposed for 2014 with Tim serving as DLG Coordinator, and John and Gary also assisting with the effort. The contests were established **as both "clinics" and "contests"** – the goal of introducing newbies to DLG and getting experts to help mentor and answer any questions. The series of 9 contests in 2014 started in February, avoided May for conflict with IHLGF and avoided December holidays. John McNeil served as CD for the Feb 2014 meeting, with Tim as CD for the March contest and Gary as CD for April. These three rotated CD duties for much of 2014 (with thanks to Doug Cronkhite who filled in as CD for Gary in October 2014). Having three dedicated people associated with this series really made sure it was going to be a success.



As many know, Tim Traver also helped develop the F3X Vault itself for use by the TPG and the international community (This amazing level of dedication is its own reason for a Modeler of the Year Award). However, as F3X Vault was taking hold, Tim also made sure the associated scoring and timing system was used at the IHLGF and so getting people practiced with the new approach would be a part of the monthly contest/clinics.

TPG History: The Trophy (continued)

The IHLGF 2014 was a considerable success with \$2000 raised for the USA F3K Team. At the time this was the largest single donation ever made to the team.

In addition to this service to the DLG community at Poway, in 2014 Tim also attended many slope racing contests associated with the Southern California Slope Races (SCSR) circuit. This included meets at Vincent, Point Fermin, and other locations. He flew in the Team USA F3F contest at the Heaven slope site in Corona. Along with teammates Warren Day and Steve Situm, Tim Traver attended the 2014 FAI F3F World Championships in Donovaly Slovakia placing 20th out of 51 pilots. Team USA F3F placed 6th that year.

Tim was exceptionally energetic for both DLG and slope within TPG throughout this period. He volunteered to serve as DLG Coordinator again in 2015 and continued flying both disciplines. At the 2014 TPG Holiday Dinner on December 9, 2014 at the Automotive Museum in Balboa Park, Tim Traver was awarded the Modeler of the Year trophy as it was hard to think of any other modeler who had done more for both TPG and the international RC soaring community as a whole that year.

Tim Traver has continued flying mainly F3F, F3B, DLG, and F5J since that time. He has participated on four USA teams at FAI World Championships. In addition to the 2014 F3F worlds, he has flown in the 2018 F3F World Championships (13th place), 2022 F3F World Championships (14th place), and most recently the 2023 F3B World Championships (30th place). F3L/F3-RES Contest Series

In 2021, the Federation Aeronautique Internationale (FAI) approved a new contest format for hi-start launched thermal soaring with rudder-elevator-spoiler (RES) aircraft. This type of event had been flown for many years as F3-RES but its formalization as the new “F3L” program for “RC thermal gliders RES” was approved in 2021. The rules for this can be found in the current FAI Sporting Code for Aeromodelling under Volume F3 Soaring.

A goal of the F3L program is to serve as a low-cost introduction to RC soaring competition that is achievable even for those who have average skills.

F3L has been gaining in popularity in the US, and our recent virtual club meeting in late 2022 on the topic by Corky Miller and Larry Jolly inspired many to try it out. So, in 2023 we have established a new F3L program with quarterly contests. We will be using the FAI rules and have year-end trophies for open and sportsman classes. Contests will be held at the Encinitas Flight Center with pilots meeting at 8:45am, first launch at 9:00am. A small entry fee will be required to help offset the costs of club equipment. F5J Fun Fly and Contest/Clinic Series

Want to get into F5J, but not quite sure how do it? Or maybe you have a Radian in your hangar and are looking for an excuse to get out for a bit of fun-flying. Then come on out to the Poway field and check out one of our F5J Fun-Fly events.

We started out calling this a foamy event because the Night Radian was (and continues to be) the most popular plane to fly. However, we began simply calling it an F5J Fun Fly, because any glider under 2 meters that can be flown to the F5J rules as we apply them at Poway is welcome. This is a fly-what-you-got type event, so everything from a vintage Easy Glider to a brand-new Yellow Jacket is welcome.

We configure the field with landing tapes and the sound system to get as close to full-up F5J flying as possible. To maximize everyone's flying time, we reduce the flight window to 7 minutes. This is a very low-key meet-up and everyone is welcome no matter what your skill level.

We've completed all of our fun flies for 2023, but keep an eye out for announcements for the 2024 F5J Fun Fly schedule. As in 2023, pilots meeting is at 8:45 with first up at 9 am. We typically fly five or six rounds, finishing up by noon. The event is free to TPG members and \$5 for guests. We do ask everyone to pre-register on the F3X Vault so we know how many pilots to expect and can run the matrix ahead of time.

We are hoping that these events will help to introduce new pilots to what TPG has to offer. See you at our next F5J Fun Fly. Whatever you bring, you are sure to have a great time. If you have been thinking about getting into F5J, but were not sure where to start this is the event for you.

What is LSF? – Gary Fogel

The League of Silent Flight (LSF) <https://www.silentflight.org/> is the special interest group (SIG) representing RC soaring to the Academy of Model Aeronautics. LSF has its own lengthy and important history, having first been conceived of in Northern California over 50 years ago, and helps arrange the annual RC soaring Nationals at Muncie, Indiana each summer. In addition to this, LSF has two types of Soaring Accomplishment Programs (SAPs) that encourage personal skill development in the sport and are fun! There is an SAP that is strictly for RC soaring (the oldest and original SAP) and with the advent of electric launch methods, an eSAP was added more recently that duplicates the original SAP but with the use of electric motors for launch.

Each SAP consists of a series of five levels of achievement with increasing difficulty (Figure 1). The levels involve slope and thermal soaring, spot landings, cross-country flights and participation at contests. A pilot needs to achieve Level I before proceeding to Level II and so forth all the way up through Level V.

The people who originated the program in the 1970s arranged it such that it was easy for novice pilots to attain Level I with minimum effort. However, as pilots proceed through intermediate levels, they have to attend contests (with increasing number of total contestants per contest to qualify) and accumulate points (and/or wins). For instance, for Level II a contest can be as few as five participants, whereas by Level IV the contest has to be at least 15 participants. This requirement helps drive interest in contests as they are crucial towards proceeding to the next level. Those interested in the LSF program help foster contest development.

What is LSF? – (continued)



Similarly, pilots who regularly hone their skills at contests generally improve in overall performance and over time, seek increasingly different and difficult tasks. By the time a pilot achieves Level IV, the Level V tasks can feel daunting. A 2-hour thermal duration flight. An 8-hour slope duration flight (some refer to this as the “bladder test”). A goal and return cross-country flight of 6.2 miles out and 6.2 miles back. Its longer than it seems. And Level V requires 3 contest wins at large contests over 20 participants. These days it can be hard to find contests of this size, and the requirement to win them really means the pilot has to be on the top of their game. It can take years or decades for a pilot to complete Level V. Some pilots never do complete Level V; in fact, only 138 people in the history of the program have done so.

So how do you get started? It's EASY. Firstly, go to:

and print out a copy of the voucher form. Choose the path you wish (SAP and/or eSAP)

Bring the appropriate voucher with you to any of our many TPG events in 2023 and participate! If, for instance, you are flying in an F5J contest, each landing can be considered as a spot landing for the Level I and II requirements. Even the contest flights can have sufficient time to satisfy Level I requirements. Whenever you do make an achievement, have the contest director or your timer sign your form as a witness. We have Torrey Pines Gliderport (and other slopes) at our disposal – easy to get a 15 min slope flight with your buddies.

Once you've completed all of the Level I tasks, submit the completed voucher to LSF Secretary John Marien at john@ne-aero.com as a pdf scan or photo that clearly shows the witness signatures. John will then review your voucher and email you your acceptance or rejection of the voucher submission. If for some reason your voucher is rejected, you will have to adjudicate rejections with John.

A question then – who in the TPG has what LSF levels in SAP and eSAP? Well, we collect that information as a part of membership renewal. The Table on the following page provides the current LSF Levels for those who indicated so on their membership forms. This can (and should!) of course change over time.

Note that we have 11 members who are SAP Level I and 3 members who are eSAP Level 1. It doesn't take much for them to get to Level II. At the other end of the spectrum, we have 8 members who are Level IV. It's going to take some teamwork to get them to Level V. In between we have lots of pilots who can benefit by flying in our contests or getting out for some slope duration at Torrey, etc. If you aren't on the list and have achieved an LSF level, please let me know.

What is LSF? – (continued)



How many Level increases can TPG members achieve in 2023 for either SAP or eSAP? Feel free to reach out to me or others on this list and they will be pleased to help recommend some strategies or serve as a witness if they can, for your achievements. If there is interest, we could arrange special LSF days; we had on such LSF day on August 12th.

Use our many contests and fun flies as a way to help advance in these programs. Just be sure to bring your vouchers and if necessary, arrange in advance for the proper number and type of witnesses so they can sign your form afterwards.

So, verify that the club has your correct email, make sure you receive an invitation to join Google Groups and sign up!



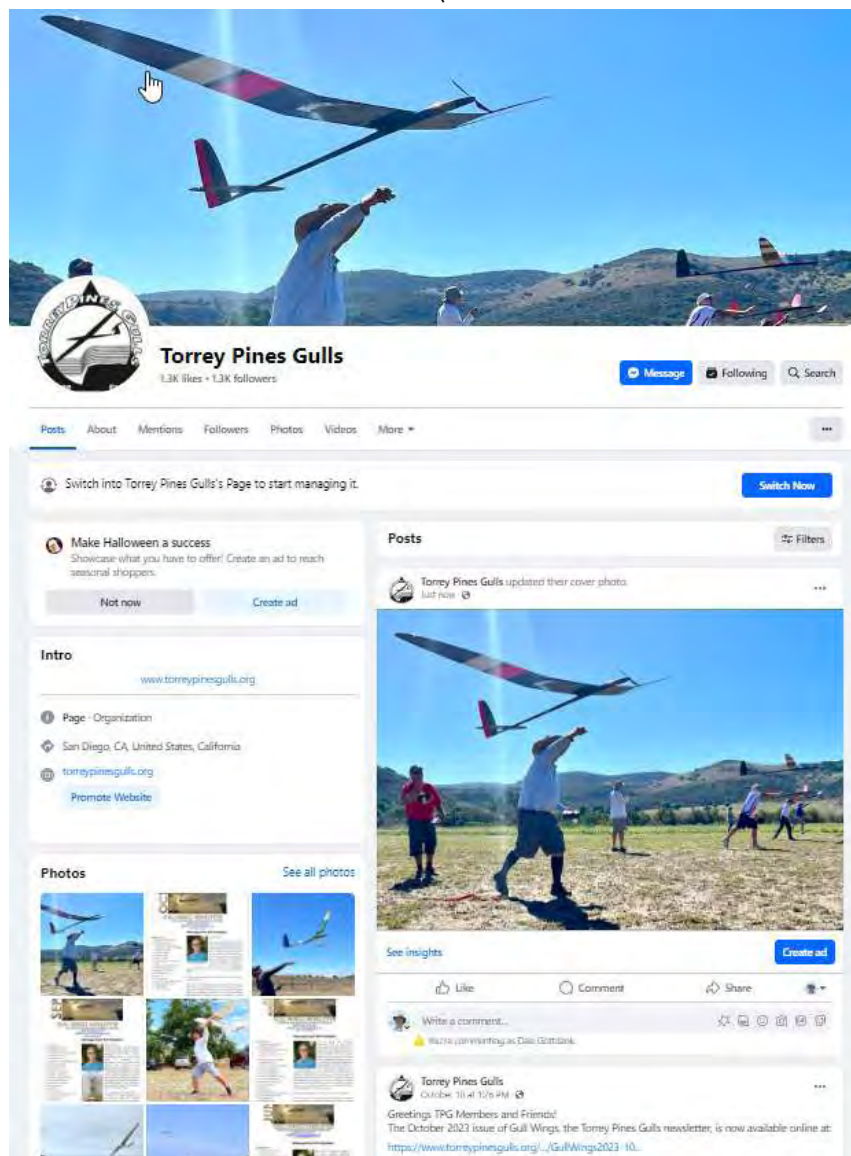

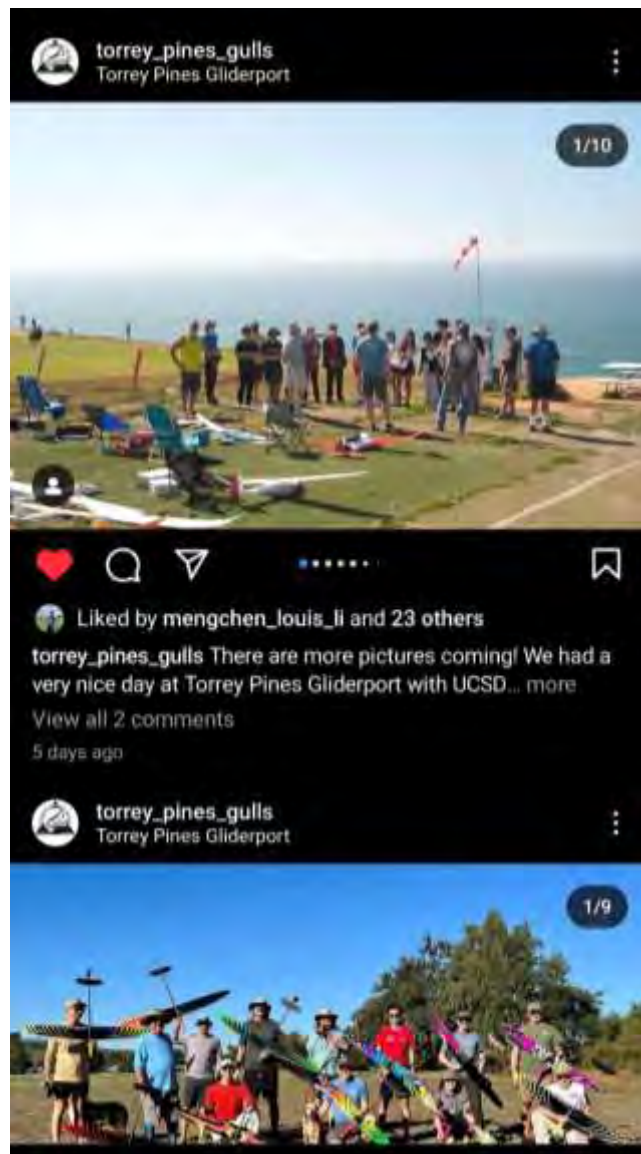
